	Pedagogical Approaches to Developing Pianists Dr Poom Prommochart, Lecturer and Steinway Artist.
	Students are often guided on technicalities rather than psychological and musical preparedness, more so when working on polyphonic works which can be abstract. In this lecture-recital, Poom Prommochart explores the important points to be aware when learning selected polyphonic works from the Baroque and Romantic period. The session will also consider different approaches to teach different levels of pianists in nurturing musicality from a young age.

2.00 – 2.45 Remote Rhythm Foundations: Developing counting and subdivision via innovative online teaching.

Asso. Prof. Dr Tom Pierard, Lecturer

This presentation explores strategies for effectively teaching rhythmic fundamentals in online learning environments. Through practical demonstrations and research-based insights, participants will discover how to leverage digital tools and interactive exercises to foster rhythmic fluency in students. Emphasis will be placed on adaptable approaches to counting, subdivision, and rhythmic patterns that can be easily integrated into existing curricula.

3.00 – 3.45 Helping Students overcome Musical Inhibition Datin Dr Kathryn Ang, Music Educator

Musical inhibition can contribute to performance anxiety, where musicians may experience loss of confidence, loss of interest, and trauma during a performance. This psychological pressure can impede their ability to express themselves freely, hindering the natural flow of creativity and compromising the overall quality of their musical delivery. Issues related to parenting, teaching, and the prevalent culture of exams and competitions are factors that influence inhibition. Teachers generally attempt to bolster the motivation of students to help them overcome the inhibition.
